



Our committee, which consisted of Junior Fellows Joseph Berkovits, Vinay Chaudhri, Sean DiGiovanna, Sharon Leiba, Kelley McKinley, Senior Fellows David James and Christopher Barnes, and Alumni Representatives Syed Abbas and Linda Schofield, certainly accomplished our objective, for we sponsored and supported many kinds of both academic and non-academic events

The year was kicked off with a trip to the Shaw Festival at Niagara-on-the-Lake to see George Bernard Shaw's <u>Pygmalion</u>, which was enjoyed by all. Thanks to the purchase of a VCR by the 1991-1992 L.M.F. Committee, the Massey community enjoyed a host of video nights during the year which were sponsored by the L.M.F., from an Alfred Hitchcock double feature to a thirteen-hour Blackadder marathon to an Inspector Clouseau-Pink Panther double-bill, where everything was pink-- including the popcorn!

The L.M.F. also planned different kinds of parties during the year. Our Halloween party, complete with pumpkin-carving and costume contests, was a great success. A Brief and Arbitrary History of Massey College by Neil Patrick Kennedy

How does one go about trying to find out about the history of Massey College? I have ransacked a number of different sources: a previous incarnation of the Massey Bull; the papers of previous Dons, passed on to me by Janice Dumont, Don of Hall in 1992-3; the 1972 edition of the Encyclopedia Canadiana; Mel Hurtig's Canadian Encyclopedia; Who's Who in Canada; The Canadian Who's Who; and the Canadian Annual Review for 1963. Having found a welter of information about different people associated with the college over the years, how does one go about trying to improve on that information? A number of possibilities present themselves. One could play a sort of shell game: which Massey is which? One could offer a serious consideration of the personalities involved in the

history of the college: Massey is, after all, more a community than a building. One could imitate a pater song from a Gilbert and Sullivan operetta, and rattle off, as rapidly as humanly possible, an all-but-endless list of the achievements of various members of the Massey family- particularly of Vincent- of Robertson Davies, the founding Master, and of a great many other people associated with the college over the last thirty years. One could offer a parody of one of the less impressive characteristics of the Old Testament. One could dabble in imitation Victorian melodrama. I have decided to adopt all these approaches.

Massey College opened its gates in 1963, but the history of the College begins a little before that date- 330 years before. In 1630, Geoffrey Massey landed at Salem, "to become one of the founders of the Massachusetts Bay Colony," (according to the Encyclopedia Canadiana). This is the point at which I am forced to begin parodving the Old Testament. Geoffrey begat a son who begat a son who... begat Daniel (1798-1856) who begat Hart Almerin (1823-1896) who begat Walter Edward Hart (1858-1901) and Chester Daniel (1830-1928) who begat (Charles) Vincent (1887-1967) and Raymond Hart (1896-19830. This is a very limited sampling of Masseys,- an unwary or overly innocent person could easily get lost in the crowd of them, and be left dazedly asking, "Which Massey is which?" What is most important to bear in mind about the early years of the family is what follows: Daniel Massey left the United States for Canada in 1802, and founded a machine manufactory in the middle of the century; Hart Almerin Massey was an aggressive entrepreneur, something of a buccaneer in his business practices, who by the 1890's had turned Massey Mfg. Co. into the largest concern of its kind in the British Empire; he was also a committed Methodist, and felt a strong need to reconcile his wealth with his faith. This need was the genesis of the Massey tradition of public benefaction, some of whose early fruits include a mission for the destitute, Massey Hall and Hart House at the University of Toronto.

You have already read what is most important about the Massey Family, but I feel obliged to provide a little more information about two of the most illustrious of the Masseys, Vincent and his brother Raymond. The wealth of one generation of Masseys was combined with great diligence to create greater wealth and greater opportunities for diligence in the next generation. This pattern was repeated over several generations. It was not, however, a pattern that Raymond wished to repeat. He did want to do something that his age and class thought inappropriate for a gentleman, perhaps even shameful. This is the point at which we find ourselves plunged into melodrama, in more than one sense. Raymond Massey wished to go on the stage. Yes- the stage. He in fact had a long and illustrious career as an actor, on the stage (as an extremely distinguished Shakespearean actor), on the silver screen (as, for instance, Lincoln in Abe Lincoln in Illinois (1939)), and on television (as, for instance, Dr. Gillespie in Dr. Kildare in the 50s and 60s).

One could create a formidably lengthy patter song out of all the honours and achievements of Raymond's older brother, Vincent. I will limit myself to three. In 1949 he was appointed chairman of the Royal Commission on National Development in the

Arts, Letters and Sciences; the report written by the Commission was submitted in 1951; one of its consequences was the establishment of the Canada Council in 1952. That same year he became at physical emblem of Canada's gradual evolution towards independence as a nation: he became the first Canadian-born Governor General (and served in that capacity until 1959). In 1959 he entered a retirement that was very active indeed, including among other public benefactions, the creation of Massey College.

The accomplishments of Vincent Massey could have made one formidable patter song. A number of other people associated with the College could provide a dizzingly intricate chorus of patter songs of their quite formidable achievements. Where would one begin? Whom would one cover? Where would one end? What should be said, for instance, about the achievements of the Founding Master, Robertson Davies, someone involved not only in the creation of Massey College, but also of the Stratford Festival, and academic, a critic, a playwright and one of the finest novelists in English of our age? What should be said of former junior fellows who have gone on to be both academics and creators of institutions themselves- people like John Leyerle and Ian Lancashire, who both teach in the English Department at the University of Toronto, and who shared in the early days of Poculi Ludique Societies (PLS), responsible for staging Medieval and Renaissance plays, pageants and sundry other spectacles? What should one say about John Polanyi or about the current Master, busy at work on her new book? In trying to think of which persons and accomplishments to single out for mention, we have arrived at a confusingly large-scale version of a shell game- and yet, the persons and achievements mentioned represent only a fraction of the possibilities that the history of Massey holds out.

The ancient Romans, when they held a triumph celebrating the victories of a hero, worried about over-inflating the vanity of the victor. To prevent this unfortunate sideeffect, a slave would crouch in the chariot of the victor, whispering to him reminders of his mortality. I now wish to perform the function of that slave, by reminding the College of one of the less proud moments of its history. The College officially opened its gates on 4 October, 1963. The Act of Incorporation restricted junior fellowship to "male students of the School of Graduate Studies; women are allowed into the Hall as guests during the Sunday buffet supper only." (Massey Bull, October, 1974). Between 1964 and 1969 the rules concerning women guests were gradually liberalized. In 1970-71 the House Committee discussed the possibility of female Junior Fellows- with no results. In 1971-72 various attempts were made to extend Junior Fellow status or elements of Junior Fellow status to Southam Fellows Marion Bruce and Betty Lee. Debate over the issue became increasingly acrimonious. In May 1973, the "College Corporation votes unanimously to accept women as junior and senior fellows for the 1974-75 year, and thereafter." (Massey Bull, October 1974).

The passing years have done much to scrub this particular blot from Massey's escutcheon. The high water mark was perhaps the 1992-3 year, when the Master, the College Secretary, the Assistant to the Secretary, the Bursar, the Assistant to the Bursar, the College Librarian, the Don of Hall, the Chair of the Lionel Massey Fund Committee, all but one member of the House Committee and a goodly number of Junior Fellows were women. The lone male left in a position of any authority was the writer of this essay, as the one man on the House Committee. The brightest element of Massey's history, however, has yet to be mentioned: the history that will be forged by the present and future generations of Massey fellows.
